


another story. We are tired, hungry, sometimes cranky and right now I could use a good burp. I have noticed that will re-

Sylvia's Super Pasta Salad

1 lb. pasta (Sylvia used shells)

1 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. pepper

1 tsp. celery seed

1 c. chopped celery

4 carrots, shredded

2 c. Hellman's light mayonnaise

1/2-3/4 c. white vinegar

1 can of sweetened condensed milk

1 c. sugar

1 chopped red onion

1 chopped green pepper (optional)

Cook pasta al dente. Mix spices and liquids; add veggies and cooked pasta. Chill overnight. Makes a large batch.

OUR ANNUAL CVIDS FALL PLANT SALE AND POTLUCK IN MONTICELLO, IOWA IS COMING UP!

Our fall sale will be held on Saturday, August 24th (mark your calendar!) from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the gazebo in Riverside Park in Monticello, Iowa. Set-up starts at 9 a.m., and the potluck and dispersal of silent auction plant immediately follow the sale. Any club plants that were not bid on will be auctioned off live then. We hold the potluck around one as that is when the rush of public sales usually subsides. So please bring something good to eat!

Please label all plants with name, color and price, at a minimum. Height and flower size, and time of flowering is also nice to know. Choice items might also include hybridizer's name and year of introduction. Iris and day-lilies will be sold as bare-root plants. Please wash the roots well and trim back foliage. We recommend that named varieties be priced from \$5 up; unknown varieties and seedlings for less. Companion plants should be potted if possible, labeled and priced. Please bring your labeled iris, daylilies and companion plants to the park by 9 a.m. so we can have everything nicely laid out by 10 a.m. The sale lasts until 1 p.m.

Please price your plants; the members working at the sale may not be familiar with your varieties and may not know what they are worth. If you need some labels, CVIDS has purchased some rolls of them for club use. Give Gerald a call about acquiring some at (319) 372-4178. If possible, try to bring some pictures of the daylilies or iris you are contributing. Customers always ask, "What does this one look like?" It's really helpful to have some pictures so we can show them, not just tell them. Posters with colored pictures of daylilies and iris would be especially helpful. Bringing along blooms is also good for sales—and for everyone's pleasure. Last year daylilies rust appeared in some of our gardens. To reduce possible spread of the disease we asked those who had seen rust in their gardens to please bring plants other than daylilies to the sale. Although the rust seems to have disappeared, if you have seen rust in your garden THIS YEAR we do ask that you bring plants other than daylilies. If it has not appeared THIS YEAR you are welcome to contribute daylilies again.

We hope all members will be able to contribute plants, help each other with digging and labeling, and/or help out at the sale itself. We want to have a good variety of clean, fresh, healthy plants for sale! Don't forget to tell your friends and neighbors about this sale. Let's make this our most successful fall sale ever!

<u>Directions to Riverside Park</u>: The park is located on Highway 151 in Monticello, across from the Blue Chip Motel and Restaurant. You can park in the lot in the park or along the road-side in it.
