Tribute from Jonathan Poulton

The following tribute was written by Jonathan Poulton for Facebook, and is being reprinted here.

“I am sure that I am not alone in saying that I miss Verne greatly. He was a very special person to me, one of a kind. The day after his passing, I posted a tribute to him on our CVIDS' Facebook page.”

"As many of you already know, I got into daylily hybridization quite by chance while vacationing with my family in Door County, Wisconsin, in 2006. I was trying to navigate us to a beach on Lake Michigan but instead got us totally lost. However, as a result, we had the great fortune to pass by the home of daylily hybridizer Ron Mickelson, whose garden just beckoned us to stop and take a tour. Ron kindly showed us around and encouraged me to try my hand at hybridizing. “It’s easy,” he said. “Anyone can do it. Just cross pretty with pretty and see what you get!” He was right. Anyone can make a

cross in about 30 seconds flat, but choosing which parents to use in the breeding process requires lots more experience! Within about six weeks of returning from Wisconsin, I'd made several successful crosses and had lots of black, shiny seeds to show for my "hard work". But I didn't know how to germinate these beauties, so I resorted to the internet, only to find that CVIDS was holding its summer daylily sale on the following Saturday in Monticello. I arrived promptly at 9 AM and was greeted by many "hemaholics". The first club member that I dared ask for advice regarding daylily seed germination didn't hesitate, she just said, "Oh, you should talk to Verne Moore. He's that friendly gentleman over there." And that's how I met Verne and his wonderful wife Mary. "Pleased to help, Jonathan," he said. "This is how I do it". He didn't know me from Adam, yet during the next half hour he told me all his propagation secrets and then he introduced me to other CVIDS members. Well, that started for me a journey of daylily hybridization that is now in its tenth year. Along the way, Verne was very helpful and encouraging. He liked to be kept up to date on the seedlings that I felt were showing the most promise. "Have you got that true blue one yet?" he'd ask with a twinkle in his eye. Yesterday, I learned that Verne passed away in the afternoon. I already miss him greatly. No, Verne, I haven't been lucky enough to get that true blue one yet, but I'm having a lot of fun (and at times, lumbar pain) trying, and it's thanks to your kindness, humor, and expertise that I have come this far. This morning, I selected several blooms from my daylily seedlings and constructed a "path of daylilies". I would like to dedicate this path to Verne. Rest in peace, my friend."



AUGUST 20, 2016 CVIDS Fall Sale and Auctions, Potluck and Meeting

Where: at the Monticello Youth Center and outdoor PAVILLION, Jones County Fairground, 800 N. Maple Street, Monticello.

Set-up starts at **8 AM**, the public sale begins at 9 AM to 11:30. Lots of helpers are necessary for set-up and running the sale, assisting members of the public with their sales.

Bring your tagged, clean, priced cultivars and any companion perennials. The silent auction committee can always use a few more hands in the plant return categorizing held in the air conditioned Youth Center.

Please consider bringing something to share at the potluck lunch. Plan for lunch to be started after the end of the public sale and clean-up after 11:30. After the potluck lunch, brief business meeting, we will be auctioning returning club plants that haven't been snapped up by the Silent Auction bidders as well as the additional iris bonus plants that were received. I am looking for a **volunteer** to be the **auctioneer** for the live section of the auction day. Hope to see you there! Always lots of fun and camaraderie!

Iris Presentation at meeting: Nancy Carlisle will be conducting a 15 minute presentation about dividing iris rhizomes, treating for iris borers, at the August 20th meeting.

SWAP AND SEEK Right now the 14 participants are sending to each other as e-mail attachments their "wish list" and "swap list". It is not too late to still be part of the swapping action. Check out the list on the Bulletin Board who is already involved and send them an email. Then the fun begins! Each person contacts the grower of any plants that they are interested in, and any negotiations, bargains, sales, etc., are totally between the two growers. Traders will bargain for any deals that are personally acceptable to them (e.g. 1 for 1 "even" trades, 2-3 older plants for one newer cultivar, 4 fans for 2 fans, clump for clump, etc). Likewise, they are making their own arrangements for transporting swapped plants (e.g. by private car, at the August sale in Monticello, via U.S. mail, etc). We hope that many more of you will be able to participate next year in another avenue of obtaining new cultivars to your gardens through this event. And those blooms in the following seasons will remind you of CVIDS friends and the wonderful camaraderie that we share through daylilies! I participated last year and Verne brought me a lovely plant that I have treasured even more since his passing.

Silent Auction: We are very grateful to Heather Harroun for running the Silent Auction again this year. As the bid sheet indicates, more than 45 club plants are returning to CVIDS after being in members' gardens for the past 2-3 years. **ALL MEMBERS** are now invited to make bids on any or all of these cultivars. Take a moment to peruse the bid sheet and see whether there are any that you'd like to have in your garden. (Bid sheet is available at www.cvids.org under the bulletin board tab. Descriptions of the plant are also available under the Club Plants tab. Check out the AHS website database for pictures and other information) Then, place your bids on the sheet and return it to Heather by email, phone call or text before August 17th. Here are a few instructions that Heather has kindly provided.

1) Please mail your bids to: Heather Harroun 11723 – 238th St. W. Illinois City, IL 61259. You may also text them (or leave a voice mail) to 563-554-0028 or **preferred method** of emailing to jhsharroun@outlook.com. PLEASE NOTE THAT THE ENDING OF HER E-MAIL ADDRESS HAS CHANGED! **No money** is to be sent at this time! You pay in Monticello at the silent bid table.

2) Make your bids in uneven dollar amounts. For example: \$22.47, not \$22.00.

3) The **minimum** bid is the amount listed.

4) Cultivars with ???? in the bid amount are plants that Heather does NOT know the status of. They may be coming, they may not be coming. You may bid on them if you wish but she may not know until the 20th if they are returning back. IT is a **responsibility** of the club member to let Heather know, and to get the plant to Monticello.

5) Any single fans will be awarded at ½ cost of the highest bid.

6) Do your homework! If there is a plant you really want (especially the more expensive ones), contact the person who grew it to get a report on its performance. This is the very reason we purchase these plants! It is to try them out in our gardens.

7) Bidders will be notified of their winning bid by **August 19th**. Winners must pick up and pay for their plants at the Monticello sale. If unable to do so personally, they should arrange for a proxy to collect and pay for their plants, letting Heather know this arrangement.

8) In case of ties in pricing bid, the earliest postmark or e-mail wins.

9) If more fans come back on August 20th, than were expected, the next highest bidder(s) will receive the plant.

Kudos for the Silent Auction Committee Team, Heather Harroun, Sara Hankemeier and Diane Derganz. Heather will be stepping out after this fall. We are looking for some additional volunteers to help learn the process.

Betty Miller Photo Contest

Our annual Betty Miller Photo Contest was started in 2006 in honor of Past President and hybridizer Betty Miller. She had a passion for photographing daylilies and mentored several CVIDS members on how to take good photos. Her photos were featured in “Eureka” and daylily catalogs from 2001-2004.

The 10th Annual Contest held in 2015 had the following categories: (1) Large flowers, (2) Doubles, (3) Unusual forms and spiders, (4) Clumps, (5) Landscapes (photo must include daylilies or irises), (6) Hybridizers’2015 seedlings, and (7) Novelties. (e.g., garden sculptures, birdhouses, animals, etc. but the photo must include daylilies or irises). First place winners in each category received \$25, and the Grand Prize winner received \$50. Names of winners as well as their daylily photos are posted on the website and recorded in the Newsletter. Expect similar rules this year. Get out those beautiful photos and start submitting.
