Karol Emmerich discovered rust in her greenhouse this winter, in spite of meticulous conditions. Fungus does not winter over in the north and she will be treating it with the appropriate fungicides. Since fungus does not go away

immediately, once it sets in the best we can do is control it for the season. I made the decision to cancel the order from her for this year and we will reorder next year. We should applaud Karol for notifying us of the rust.

A selection of plants from Bill Waldrop of Kennesaw Mountain Daylilies will be coming instead. Bill is a fairly new hybridizer from Marietta, Georgia who produces quality daylilies. He does not hybridize on the scale of Gossard or Hanson but does very nice plants. His daylilies are mainly large, round, ruffled or toothed, with very saturated colors, especially reds and purples.
