#### Minutes of meeting held at Morning Sun Community Center on Saturday, April 10, 2010.

President Mike Carstensen called the meeting to order at 1:05 pm. 31 members and 3 guests were present. Gerald Hobbs provided a lovely spring bouquet of brunnera and daffodils. Papenhausens provided a DVD program with "A Day of Daylilies" and interviews of Mort Morss and David Kirchkoff by Charles Dorsey.

Approval of meeting minutes for March as published M/S/C Clay Dawson, Zora Ronan. Treasurer Bob Moore reported we had money. (Nancy did not catch exact amounts).

Committee Reports: Bob Moore requested that people see him for tags for the upcoming May Plant Sale. Barb Papenhausen questioned if plant distribution was to be conducted as usual; plant sales at the 2009 Distribution had brought income of \$3,700 that was used for banquet and the walk about. She stated that the club had voted on having fewer expensive plants, more auction type of plants that more could afford. The previous year, the expensive plants did not bring the return that they should have during silent auction. President Mike graciously explained that he should have been in better control of the March discussion. The Region One Tour committee had only presented a possible option of using 2010 plants Round Two auction as a potential way of having members grow bus plants to return in 2012. Jan Null asked if there would be a Bus Plant selection committee. Zora Ronan assured there would be. Clay Dawson suggested that they be good plants that do well here.

**May Plant Sale:** Chair Zora Ronan asked people to bring chairs and tables, get their plants marked and tagged with pictures if possible. No other sales in Cedar Rapids are occurring, but Project Green is in lowa City on that day. Articles will be published in the North Liberty Leader, lowa City Press Citizen, and the Cedar Rapids Gazette. WMT Master Gardeners are only on the Wednesday program as the hour on Saturday is now a paid spot by local nurseries. However, they will still announce the sale. Keith Riewerts volunteered to write an article for the eastern-lowan newspapers for sale coverage.

**Region One Tour of 2012:** Chair Jackie Westhoff was not present to provide a report. There will be a meeting of the board following meeting. Bob Moore invited people to look around the Community Center. It is a lovely facility that will be welcomed by the city of Morning Sun.

Meeting was adjourned at 2:06. Papenhausens showed the pictures of the 2010 plants that are coming. (Oh, now to make that decision for which plant I want!)

### **Directions to West Liberty**

**From the East: Take I-80 West to Exit 259.** Turn Left onto X-40. Go South into West Liberty. Turn Left onto North Columbus Street. Go to Stop Light. Continue straight across RR tracks to East First Street. Turn Right. Proceed 3 blocks into Fair Grounds. County Activity Building is first large building on the grounds.

**From the West**: Take either of 2 ways: 1) Interstate 80 East to Exit 259. Turn Right onto X-40, and proceed as above, or 2) Take Hiway 6 from Iowa City East for about 17 miles into West Liberty (6 Becomes North Columbus Street). Then proceed as above.

# CVIDS Members Gardens on Display Saturday, July 10, 2010

Dr. William Blair (CIDS member), Joyce and Steve Parsons, Jonathan Poulton, and Barry and Lynn Stoll have agreed to be garden hosts for this summer's open garden tours. The committee of Nancy Carlisle (chair), Shirley Waters, Lynn Stoll, and Mike Carstensen are planning out the route and finalizing the meal site of Wildwood for the meal location. Map and further details will be presented at the Plant Distribution.

## **Garden Tour Descriptions**

### Dr. William Blair, Iowa City

The gardens are designed into the south slope of a small hill in a woodland setting. Central to the gardens is a small prairie restoration project, an homage to the American Indians who once summer camped on the site. Limestone walls and walkways define curving and elevated beds. Multiple beds of hostas occupy shaded areas under oak and locust trees.

The emphasis of the gardens, though, is the daylilies. They are almost entirely tets, featuring about 250 registered plants, some breeding stock, and a few thousand seedlings in different stages of development. Early in my hybridizing efforts I focused on and tried to breed large UFs and spiders with saturated colors. Presently, I am trying to put "busy borders" and sculpting into some of these large blooms. I'm hoping that visiting CVIDS members will help evaluate and lend well-considered opinions on the newest cultivars.

### The Poultons' Iowa City Yard

Our house on Alpine Drive in Iowa City sits on a small city lot, which, given my goal of trying to create some interesting daylily hybrids, often seems scarcely bigger than a postage stamp! After four years of trying my hand at hybridizing, most of our existing beds are now full of daylily breeding stock or seedlings, punctuated here and there by some small islands of other perennials and annuals. "Not with this wife will you dig up any more lawn for new daylily beds" is the perennial chant from my ever-patient wife Susie. So, wishing to extend our marriage past the 20-year anniversary we'll be celebrating in May, I have to keep in mind that, if I want to add a new daylily to my collection, an existing one has to go! The problem of hybridizing lilies in such tight quarters is compounded by my reluctance to cull out those seedlings that lack real merit, perhaps a trait that afflicts many beginners. Anyhow, on our sloping lot, we have accumulated about 125 registered cultivars that constitute my current breeding stock. Many of these are bicolors or

bitones, a particular weakness of mine, but more recently I have added several patterned daylilies that took my fancy. My first seedlings, which bloomed in 2008, came mostly from crosses made with Frans Hals. Originating from crosses involving about a dozen bicolors, my 2009 seedlings were far more interesting (photos will be added to our website following my retirement in mid-May), and I look forward to sharing my 2010 seedlings with you during this year's Garden Tour.

#### Walnut Hill Gardens, Atalissa

First, please wear sturdy walking shoes; the garden is on hilly and uneven ground. Second, award-eligible cultivars on this year's ballot will be flagged. Judges will have the opportunity to see over 125 of the cultivars on their ballot blooming (or struggling) in an Iowa garden. Third, Lynn's summer project this year is to test a variety of blue and white summer-blooming companion plants (while waiting for Jonathan's blue daylily!). Plants to be tested will include white liatris, phlox, Echinacea, cleome, snapdragons, Shasta daisies. Physostegia, Nierembergia, and Asiatic and Oriental lilies, as well as blue Veronica, Salvia, delphiniums, lupines, petunias, balloon flowers, flax, lobelia, plumbago, geraniums, and cornflowers. Finally, several of Lynn's future daylily introductions need names; whoever suggests the name that is eventually registered for that daylily will win a free plant when it is introduced.

Thirty years ago, Lynn and Barry Stoll bought ten acres of the most wooded, hilly land they could find in Eastern Iowa. This grew into a small perennial nursery called Walnut Hill Gardens. Walnut Hill Gardens is an official display garden for the American Hemerocallis Society, and has been a featured garden on regional and national tours. Garden visitors can enjoy the sunny perennial gardens which feature over 2500 different named daylily cultivars and many seedlings, along with over 250 different Siberian and species irises. In the cool shade of the timber, over 500 different hostas and other shade-loving plants and wildflowers can be seen along the paths that wind past the gazebo and through the woods. The gardens are accented by a collection of outdoor sculptures including three commissioned metal sculptures by the late Iowa City artist Eric Shaw. A three-quarter acre pond provides a nesting site to wild waterfowl.

### Joyce Parsons, Conroy

The garden started 13 years ago with 5 or 6 daylilies. After that, I kept digging up more yard and putting in more daylilies and other perennials. Now, I'm referred to as the (crazy) flower lady of Conroy.
