Winter Impacts on Gardens

As we plan for the eventual spring warm up, what did this harsh winter do to my garden? How often do we get winters with extreme cold like this? The official weather station in the Quad Cities recorded -27 on January 16 with many of our northern counties even colder (-38 recorded in Clinton). The Quad Cities is designated as a Zone 5a on the USDA Plant Hardiness map. Winter temperatures are expected to bottom out between -15 to -20 degrees.

Due to the extreme cold this winter, there will be some negative impacts on our gardens. In 2007, an unusually warm March was followed by a record-breaking Arctic blast the first week of April. This resulted in over \$2 Billion damages to the agriculture and horticulture industries in central and southeast US. Plants broke dormancy in the unusually warm March that made them more vulnerable to the April freeze. Timing and duration of the cold are factors that affect a plant's ability to survive extreme temperatures. Snow cover can be a detriment and a benefit. Snow can act as an insulator like a thermal blanket, so herbaceous perennials that reestablish from underground roots or bulbs may not fair so badly. On the down side, air temperatures average 15 degrees colder than when the ground is bare. Snow reflects the sunshine rather than allowing it to warm up the air. We have had a number of days with snow on the ground this year. Plant material above the snow has been very stressed by the extreme cold. The snow also covers the food for wildlife allowing them to browse on vegetation above the snow.

Plant hardiness zones can be a useful tool for assessing a plants success in your garden. Some

Program presented first: Rich Hornbaker from Hornbaker Gardens on Pondless Waterfalls. 

Sowing: Stick to it

Seed tapes - strips onto which small seeds are glued at even intervals - present an easy way to space your plants properly and alleviate the need to thin them later. Another plus: you can make these tapes while you patiently wait for planting time. Cut paper towels into 2 inch wide strips. Use a pencil to mark a series of dots along the middle of each, spacing them the distance recommended on each seed packet. Write the seed type on each strip. Squeeze a drop of nontoxic water soluble glue onto each dot and top with a seed. Once the glue sets, store the strips in a cool, dark, dry spot. When it is time to plant, follow the seed packet instructions.
