Memories Made at the Merrill in Muscatine during the Region One summer meeting July 14-16, 2023.

A HUGE shout out to all of the CVIDS members who helped in so many ways to make the "Daylilies, The Pearls of Region One" meeting in Muscatine such a smashing success. Compliments were given by the attendees about having a well planned and well organized meeting. Keith and Nancy were the co-chairs, but it truly takes the helpful hands and contributions to help make things go well. Thank you to each person who contributed.

Mike Grossmann stopped in his tracks in the ballroom when he saw the plants for the silent auction displayed. "I have never seen such nice plants coming to an auction, these were so very well taken care of." coming from a plant man who brought huge well rooted plants as the registration plant gift, this was a huge compliment. Kudos to Dave and Sue Kramer for the hours spent on tending the plants with their knowledge and skilled care. The plant sale brought in about \$8,700 before expenses were taken out. This money will be sent to the Region One treasurer for use in Region One expenses over the year.

We had 76 people who registered for the meeting, 73 persons actually attended with some last minute cancellations related to a family death, a fall, and a hospitalization. We served 91 meals on Friday, and 90 people on Saturday night with members and guests making up the total. Check out went well with Deb Hansen, Shelly Lett and Jackie Westhoff being efficient with the help of using the Square device for charge cards. Diane Derganz, Keith Riewerts and Diann Pavelka put many hours into the organization of the Power-point that Jonathan Poulton placed on the website and Jason Halonen put on the Region One Facebook page.

Thanks to all the members who contributed to the Silent Auction. We had over 140 items with an excellent assortment. It was well attended and the bidding was busy. Big shout outs to Diann Pavelka in creating the Powerpoint for promotion that ran in the room and was on the website. Deb Hansen was a trooper in taking in the monies during the Saturday evening. Many hands made this new project section come together. Final totals will be tallied when the committee meets on Friday, August 11th. This money will be part of meeting the expenses of the Regional.

Tri-State Tour buses arrived on time with delightful drivers. Many thanks to bus captains Karmin Mullins, Lynn Hafner, Susie and Jonathan Poulton for keeping track of people on the bus route. Entertainment of an Iowa Trivia contest created by Rachel Moeller kept people on their toes to get the correct answer. Do you know what the state food of Iowa is? Hint: it is not sweet corn. A great tour of the 4 hosted gardens occurred with many comments on what beautiful well cared for gardens were available to view. Thank you to all who hosted, who helped dead head and get the gardens to their glory of the day. That also goes to the crew of the 11 open gardens. Record number of open gardens were a great draw to the visitors. Many of the garden judges of the Region needed to get in their required number of visits for their 5 year records as COVID had prevented touring easily in the past 2 years. Wonderful comments were made about the variety and again the quality of the gardens they visited. I know hours were spent by the individuals who were an open garden host. Thank you.

At the Wilton lunch stop, the meal was served by the crew of the Wilton Candy Kitchen in record time. Visitors then had the opportunity to visit the train depot and listen to a guided talk about the Muscatine County Freedom Rock by volunteers from the Wilton American Legion.
