CVIDS 2018 Fall Banquet Speaker

Bob Selman, Blue Ridge Daylilies was our speaker at the CVIDS 2018 Fall Banquet. His program was entertaining and instructional. Photos of beautiful daylilies were enjoyed by all along with some fun photos. Note on page 20 of the Fall 2018 Daylily Journal, is a third place landscape photo taken by Bob of his garden. He also submitted the 4th place winner.

Here's a short list of highlights from his program:

- *Do not use a high middle number for fertilizing daylilies. Bob says 24-5-11 is perfect for his daylilies.
- *Aim for a high first number and a low middle number.
- *Nitrogen is needed for green daylilies. Nitrogen makes them bigger and with fatter fans. You must use water or the daylilies will burn.
- *Time release or slow release fertilizer are ok.
- *Organic material can be added at any time.
- *Mulch depletes nitrogen and nitrogen is needed. Add nitrogen more than once per year.
- *Big plants require: Time, Water and Fertilizer
- *He does not recommend or grow tender evergreens. He says to think Hardy Dormant Daylilies.

From Dorothy Lunning:

“Sometimes it's hard to remember life before daylilies, but mine involved music and the legal field. I spent many years teaching strings and performing in various orchestras and chamber groups in several different communities, and alternated that as a legal assistant both for private firms and state government. I also have two grown daughters who make me very proud.

I first became interested in daylilies when my family lived in the South - there are lots of daylily gardens there! In fact, my grandmother's yard was filled with a very old yellow variety. Later on, when my sister was a volunteer in Dr. McDowell's garden on Court Street, I became hooked, and still have some that he sent me. Presently, I am limited in space but do my best to add one or two new ones every year. During the season, family members and I have fun exchanging pictures and bragging about what bloomed first, best, most, etc. In spite of all the new varieties and color combinations being introduced, one of my favorites is still "Peggy Jeffcoat" - so gorgeous and pictures just don't do it justice. There is much to learn about hemerocallis, such as garden design and companion planting, and I am confident CVIDS will be of help!” Dorothy Lunning


